The story of the fisherman and the genie from *The Arabian Nights* is the tale of a poor old man who happens to catch a sealed copper jar in his fisherman's net. Opening the container, he releases a very angry genie who, having been

imprisoned in the jar for four hundred years, vowed to kill whoever released him. The story ends with the fisherman outwitting the genie and tricking him back into the jar, which the fisherman quickly seals again and throws back into the sea.
